

Data collected by organizations such as the Pew Research Center shows that fewer and fewer Americans attend religious services. Based on these findings, it's obvious that religion isn't as important as it

once was. This downward trend also suggests that "religion" isn't seen as a societal need, as perhaps it had been before. Starting from these assumptions, the next question is, "Why does religion still exist?" Another way of asking this is, "Why do we continue to discuss the importance of religion?"

In the past, religion tried to answer the big questions we used to ask about our lives. We would ask questions like, "What is the meaning of life?" and "What happens at death?" Many, it seems, are satisfied with answers such as, "There is no meaning. You are born, then you die. It's the nature of life. There is no meaning to it. That's just how it is." When asked the question, "What happens at death?" the answer, "You die. That's all" is often given. This too is explained as, "That's the nature of life." There is no "mystery."[1] It's just how it is.

### "Why do we need religion?"

then you probably don't need religion. Chances are, religion is not even a consideration. On the other hand, even if you are someone who can live without religion, don't you still feel sad when someone you know dies? Should this also be explained as a part of that's just how it is?

One of the themes that I have been emphasizing recently has been expressed as, "Your Life Matters." But, even when you are feeling sad, it's not really necessary to go to a church or a temple just to hear, "Your Life Matters." If all we need is to hear or be reminded of these words, we can just as easily write these words on a piece of paper, use a magnet, and post it on our refrigerator.

Words are powerful. Unfortunately, they can also be cheap or insincere. That's why a temple has to be safe. That's why bullying should be discouraged. That's why belittling others should be avoided. If it is not, then the words, your life matters is nothing more than another note to put on a refrigerator.

Another statement we can probably all agree on is, "Community is important." A religious community, a temple, becomes important to demonstrate that words such as "your life matters" actually has meaning and is sincere.

If you are satisfied with these kinds of answers,

In other words, a religious community helps to assure that these words can be accepted and experienced as real. The different religious traditions, I think, are all probably trying to get at this truth that life matters. It is definitely true of Jodo Shinshu. For Jodo Shinshu, expressing the truth of "your life matters" is, I believe, the weight that is behind Namo Amida Butsu. For example, Shinran Shonin reveals that: *Of those who encounter the power of the Primal Vow.* 

Not one passes by in vain;

They are filled with the treasure ocean of virtues, The defiled waters of their blind passions not separated from it.

(Collected Works of Shinran, p. 364)

Here, Shinran Shonin is informing us that Namo Amida Butsu is trying to help us to realize that no life is lived in vain. This is a much bigger statement than life is lived, because just living life is no guarantee that you will appreciate that life. The bold statement that Shinran Shonin makes, reveals that living life with faith is meaningful. In the poem, Shinran Shonin also expresses how we are accepted just as we are. The image that Shinran Shonin shares with us is that of the ocean that accepts all the water from all the different rivers that enter it even if the water is "defiled." The ocean neither asks nor demands that the water become pure before entering it. Instead, the ocean works to transform all the water that enters into it the single flavor of the ocean. In terms of the poem, the water is turned into a treasure.

We live in a very complex world, filled with seeming contradictions. There is more wealth now than ever before, and yet homelessness is at crisis levels. We have made great strides in civil rights, and yet hate crimes are rising. We have raised life expectancy, but have fostering things like quarter life crises that are not satisfied with answers such as, "that's just how it is." Although still limited to the very rich, space is becoming a travel destination while we also worry about high school students plotting to shoot and kill their classmates. If these circumstances are viewed as rivers, then there is plenty we can call "defiled." Do we need to take the good with the bad, like with birth and death? Or, is there a way, as Shinran Shonin suggests in their poem, that can transform this current murky state into something mutually beneficial and beautiful like a treasure ocean of virtues for all?

Why do we continue to discuss the importance of religion? Why do we have religions? If you can be satisfied with the answer, "You are born, then you die," then religion is probably nothing more than a relic from the past for you. It is something that might be kept as nostalgic. As for our current circumstances, all we really need to do is endure or ignore it until we die. If, on the other hand, you sense that life is more than you are born, then you die, then to those without faith, life may appear to be a mystery. But to those with faith, life is not a mystery. It is an enormous gift. Being able to live life as a gift, knowing that it cannot be lived in vain, may not be able to solve things like homelessness, but it may help steer us away from the unnecessary destruction of life as well as shield us from things like guarter or mid-life crises. This may seem like wishful thinking, but if you are born, then you die can be described as the nature of life, then I see life is a gift as the nature of a religious life.

[1] Although I used the expression "mystery," this is, I believe, a misnomer. I say this because I find that people of faith tend to accept, understand, and live their lives with less fear and anger. They also tend to live their lives with more confidence and generosity. That is not to say that people without faith can't live this way, but the great majority of people who I have encountered that demonstrate these traits to me have, by and large, been people of faith. "Mystery" is a misnomer because people of faith have found their truth. There is no "mystery" or something that needs to be "solved" for them. Faith is the solution to the mystery. If anything, a person of faith lives in "awe," and not, as the idiom describes, in "mystery."



歴史は物語っている。

仏教では、この人間の神格化ということを嫌っ てきたということができる。お釈迦さま自身も 自分を神格化することを大変嫌っておられたと いう事実がある。また、親鸞聖人も、自分を仏 として拝むようなことは絶対するなと言われ ている。親鸞聖人の有名な言葉に、「外見だけ でも、立派な悟りすました格好はするな!自分 の心の中には嘘や出鱈目が渦巻いているでは ないか。」というのがある。これを聖人は自戒 の言葉としておられるのである。人間が神にな る時、そこには何かきっと非合理なことが起こ る。そのことを一番嫌われたのが親鸞聖人であ る。人間の幸福は、誰か一人を神や仏として拝 む世界からは決して出てこない。人間全てのも のが共に崇高な理想を持っているものとして、 お互いに拝みあう心が出てくるところに必ず本 当の幸福がもたらされてくるのである。合掌
